Images of "Still I Rise"

Authors often use imagery to create comparisons between literal and figurative elements, add depth and understanding to a literary piece, and evoke a more meaningful experience for the reader. Examining Maya Angelou's masterful use of imagery throughout the poem "Still I Rise" can help you understand and interpret the poem's theme and message.

- 1. Read "Still I Rise" in its entirety. It can be found online at poets.org/poetsorg/poem/still-i-rise.
- 2. Use a highlighter to identify examples of imagery in the poem. This can include similes, metaphors, personification, hyperbole and onomatopoeia.
- 3. Divide into small groups. Each group should select one of the poem's stanzas to analyze.
- 4. In the chart below, list each example of imagery in your stanza, the type of imagery used and what you believe each element of imagery represents in the poem's theme.
