Or white like snow?”



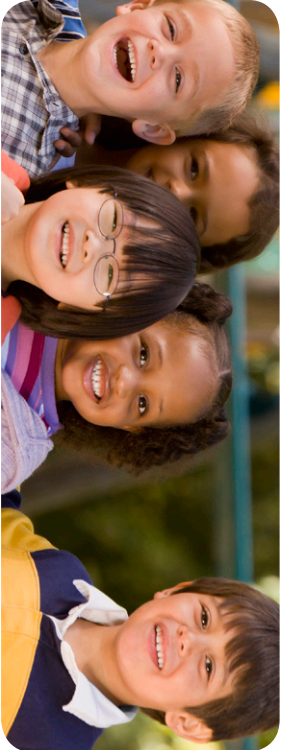
The Orangutan asks,
